Code Enforcement Corner

Each winter season, our Public Works employees put forth a huge effort to keep our streets plowed and safe for winter driving. We have asked you to help make this effort more efficient by refraining from parking on City streets and by keeping your trees trimmed so that plows can pass without causing damage to equipment or to your trees.

Beginning in early November, I have issued hundreds of courtesynotices and have been able to visit with many of you. I have received excellent cooperation in removing vehicles and trimming trees to come into compliance with our Code.

Many of you have also informed the City via our website of individuals who continue to park on the street. Thank you for your help in accomplishing this vital task. Davis County Sheriff's department is actively patrolling the City and has and will continue to issue citations for parking violations.

Also, PLEASE be aware that pushing or blowing snow onto public streets is prohibited. As you clear snow, please ensure that the snow stays on your property and is not blown or plowed into the street.

Your cooperation in helping the City handle another winter is greatly appreciated!



West Point Military Memorial

In some conversations I have had the last few months, I mentioned becoming intrigued and curious regarding the official songs of our armed forces. Fortunately for you I cannot sing them for you but I do have some research on each to share. I will report my findings, according to the seniority of the service, beginning this month then listing one or two a month until all have been reported.

The oldest service is, of course the United States Army. Their song was originally written in 1908 by then First Lieutenant Edmund L. Gruber. Gruber was an Artillery Officer stationed in the Philippines who titled his work, "The Caisson Song." In the song was the term, "...and the caissons go rolling along." A caisson was a horse drawn field artillery piece of the time. John Phillip Sousa, The March King, fleshed it out as a march in 1917 and renamed it, "The Field Artillery Song."

In 1956 the song was adopted as the official song of the Army and was retitled, "The Army Goes Rolling Along." Current lyrics tell the story of the Army's past, present, and future.

Directed by Congress about a month after the Continental Army, the Continental Navy became the precursor of the present Navy.. Their song, "Anchors Aweigh," was written in 1906 by Lieutenant Charles S Zimmerman as a fight song for the United States Naval Academy. It was first performed that year at the Army/Navy game but soon became a fixture at all Navy events. Zimmerman died just before the United States entered WWI and was replaced as the new Academy Bandmaster by (you guessed it) John Philip Sousa. Sousa would later become the conductor of the Marine Band

Though originally--and still is--the Academy Fight Song, "Anchors Aweigh" since the days of WWII has been considered the Navy's song. And for those who might not be aware, as a ship departs an anchorage, pulling in the anchor is called "weighing anchor" hence "anchors aweigh" suggests a ship is going to sea.

By the way, in that 1906 football game the midshipmen beat the cadets 10-0
