MAYOR'S MESSAGE

This past month, our friends and neighbors in Box Elder County endured a tragedy that has touched us all. Two law enforcement officers lost their lives in the line of duty while serving and protecting their community. A third officer was also wounded, along with his K9 partner. While their recovery continues, we send them our very best wishes for healing and strength. Even though this heartbreaking event did not occur within West Point, it is a reminder that the risks and sacrifices of law enforcement are shared across every community in our state.

On behalf of West Point City, I want to express our deepest condolences to the families of the fallen officers, their fellow officers, and their community. There are no words that can truly fill the void left by such sacrifice, but I hope our thoughts, prayers, and continued support offer some measure of comfort. To every law enforcement officer who continues to serve, we extend our gratitude. That especially includes the deputies of the Davis County Sheriff's Office who serve here in West Point each day. Your courage, dedication, commitment, and willingness to face danger on behalf of others will always have our respect.

Tragedies like this one remind us of the incredible devotion displayed by those who wear the badge. It also brings to mind the courage shown nearly 24 years ago on September 11, 2001, when first responders, firefighters, police officers, paramedics, and citizens ran toward danger to save lives. As we approach the anniversary of that day, we pause to remember not only the lives lost but also the courage and selfless service that carried our nation during its darkest hours.

Here in West Point, we honor that spirit of service each year through the 9/11 National Day of Service. This year, on Saturday, September 6 at 8:30 a.m., we will gather at Loy Blake Park to plant trees as a community. Planting a tree is more than a project. It is a symbol of life, renewal, and hope. Each tree we place in the ground will grow for decades to come, providing shade and beauty, but also standing as a living reminder of resilience and sacrifice.

I would like to invite you and your family to join us for this meaningful effort. Bring gloves, a shovel if you have one, and a willingness to lend a hand. The more people who come, the quicker the work will go and the greater the sense of community we will build together. Whether you are able to dig, carry, or simply encourage those working, your presence matters.

When we serve side by side, we not only honor those who have sacrificed so much for us, but we also strengthen the bonds of our own community. What better way to remember the heroes of September 11 and the brave officers who have recently given their all than by serving others ourselves?

Goat heads puncture bike tires and stick to the soles of shoes as they walk on sidewalks. Please look at your property and keep weeds cut back from sidewalks so that our kids do not have walk around them into the street.

WEST POINT MILITARY MEMORIAL



It doesn't always have to be about wars or flying. Here are some interesting facts about the fall season:

- September 22nd is the date of the Autumnal Equinox which is also commonly called the first day of Autumn.
- Because the earth's axis is slightly tilted, as we orbit the sun, there are two days the sun appears to pass directly over the equator and the day and the night are of equal length.
- The other falling on the 20th or 21st of March, is called the Vernal Equinox. That is the first day of Spring.
- Logically, our Autumnal Equinox is for the Southern Hemisphere their Vernal Equinox and our Vernal Equinox is their Autumnal Equinox.
- If you want to be outside at the exact moment the sun "passes over the equator", you need to be out at 12:19 MDT (noon), according to the Farmers Almanac and Encyclopedia Britannica.
- The opposite of the equinox is the date the sun appears to be at that point when it is furthest from the equator. This is called the Winter or Summer Solstice.
- On December 22, the first day of Winter, the Winter Solstice, the day is the shortest and the night the longest. On the first day of Summer, June 21 or 22, the day is the longest and the night the shortest. This is called the Summer Solstice.

But just in case you did want something of military history, this September 2nd marks the 80th anniversary of the signing of the Surrender Documents on board the USS Missouri in Tokyo Bay. *-Marv Drake*
